Fighting the corner for the farming industry Christmas

There is no doubt that the DEFRA Lump Sum Exit Scheme, which was criticised by many as not being generous enough, has had an effect and this year we have had five applications for retirement houses. Even with the lump sum, I am sad to say that some are still leaving their tenancy with nothing.

The rise in the value of property has had a two-fold effect on Addington. It has seen the net worth of the charity rise to an all-time high, just shy of £15 million, but at the other end retirement homes which were

costing on average £225k two years ago are now over £300k and indeed we have just purchased one costing £340k. It means we are now looking at over £1.5m to buy the six retirement schemes which is a tall order.

Our George Stephens Trust Fund to help farmworkers has also seen more activity recently and we have also been quietly busy on individual cases of helping farmers in hardship. Bovine TB has been a prominent cause for concern, as well as pig farmers who have had a torrid time and for the first-time avian flu has featured. Worryingly this has now gone a full twelve-month cycle without a remission and is now endemic in the wild bird population. The whole of the UK is now in a prevention zone which does not bode well for the industry.

The resilience of both the unsubsidised pig and poultry sectors never ceases to amaze and as the livestock industry comes under attack in the carbon debate and now "Animal Rebellion", it is worth contemplating the efficiency of the poultry industry in particular.

Short growing seasons with food conversion ratios over 80%, solar panels and AD Plants to heat and cool insulated climate-controlled sheds with the waste adding value to arable fields, mean the industry is ultraefficient and needs broadcasting from the roof tops to fight unjustified bad press. Farming needs to fight back rather than be blamed for the failings of other industries.

> The bright side has been the success of our new Young Entrants Scheme with the promise of legacy farms and some detailed discussion with stakeholders about flats above workshops

linked to parcels of land. We will use these facilities, when they arrive, to bring in young first-generation farmers into the industry with the belief that they will evaluate risk differently and take the opportunity to grow their businesses quickly to benefit the industry.

So, although times are challenging for us all there are and will be opportunities to progress, which we must

Roger Wyatt reflects on his time at Addington Fund



Roger has been a well loved and respected Addington Fund trustee since 2006, here he reflects on his time on the board as he retires. We would all like to thank Roger for the years of service, dedication and for always bringing a smile to those he works with!

"My first involvement with the Addington Fund was in 2006, which was the year that my Land Agency practice in Warwick was celebrating the bicentenary of its foundation. One of my business partners had established a social relationship with lan Bell, the then CEO of Addington."

"It was arranged that we would hold a celebratory dinner in the Members marguee on the Kenilworth Showground, and I recall that about 200 representatives of the local farming community were invited, which included both clients of the practice, and Addington contacts. The invitees were informed that after dinner there would be an Auction of Promises, and all attending were exhorted to submit a suitable Lot for the auction, the proceeds from which were to be donated to the Addington Fund. The response was overwhelming, and we were offered lots ranging from "A fortnight in a holiday cottage in Cornwall" to "A flight in a helicopter from Wellesbourne Airfield ", to his book on "The Gardens of Highgrove", signed by the author who is now our King! The auction was a huge success, despite the limitations of the auctioneer (me!). The donation of the proceeds was gratefully accepted by lan, and certainly exceeded all our wildest expectations."

"That event in 2006 fired my interest in what Addington was achieving for the farming community throughout the country, following on from its original objective of being a fundraising charity to assist farmers affected by the trauma of the 2001 Foot and Mouth Disease outbreak, and the imposed slaughter policy."

"In 2009-10, I was beginning to reduce my time in my professional practice, and I retained my contact

with Ian Bell and several of the local Addington Trustees who I knew well. I think it was in 2011 that Tom Bradley retired from the Trustee Board of Addington, and I knew that it was an organisation

with objectives close to my heart, and one that I considered that I could be able to make a useful contribution to. The rest, as they say is history. I enquired if there may be a vacancy on the Trustee board, and a couple of months or so later, I was invited to an introductory meeting at the Barford office."




