Season of change at Addington Fund

On 25th May, Addington Fund was rocked by the death of our well known and highly respected Chairman, Peter Jinman OBE, after a short but brave fight against cancer. Details of his extraordinary life are contained within this newsletter but for me as Chief Executive I have lost my rock and soundboard and I cannot thank Peter enough for the support he gave to me as an individual. Our thoughts are with his wonderful family Gill and children Charlotte, Phillipa and Henry.

Even when very ill, Peter did not miss a single beat or meeting, often zooming in from his hospital bed and chairing some intense meetings with his usual decisive but diplomatic and flamboyant style.

On his last board meeting on 26th April, which Peter attended virtually, the Trustees of both the Addington Fund and Forage Aid unanimously approved to merge charities. Discussions had been ongoing for a while and without Peter's drive to get the deal over the line it probably would not have happened. It is undoubtedly good news for both charities and although Addington is the dominant partner it gives us a well-known charitable brand in Forage Aid, which we will use to front all our disaster relief activities on farm, leaving Addington as the logical housing brand.

It also gives us two new trustees. Andrew Ward the founder of Forage Aid joins us a trustee from his arable base in Lincolnshire. Andrew is not known for his shy and retiring nature with his own weekly YouTube show "Wardy's Weekly Waffle" and many thousands of Twitter followers. Andrew is also the NFU delegate for Lincolnshire.

Joining him as a trustee is Tom Hind, who is now Chief Executive of North York Moors National Park having formerly held senior positions at the NFU, Tesco and AHDB. Tom, like Andrew, brings a great deal of experience and knowledge to an already strong board. It is also worth reminding readers that none of our Trustees claimed any expenses for their time and travelling last year which helps Addington greatly in what has been operationally a very successful financial year.

The show season is just about over now and we have had a very full show calendar attending the Devon County Show, The Royal Cornwall Show, Great Yorkshire Show,

Celebrating the exemplary life of Peter Jinman

It is with the deepest regret and sadness that the death of Peter Jinman OBE, Chairman of the Addington Fund, is announced. In Peter's role at Addington, he was respected for his exemplary leadership, commitment and wise counsel, as well as being a true friend to the Addington team and many within the wider Addington network.

Having qualified at the Royal Veterinary College, University of London in 1974, Peter went on to have a successful career as a Veterinary Surgeon. In 2010 he relinquished his position as senior partner of a veterinary practice in Herefordshire to take up the Presidency of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, but not before he had served as President of the British Veterinary Association from 2002-2003.

Recognised in further connected sectors, beyond Peter's career, he was awarded Fellowship status of the Royal Agricultural Societies, admitted as a Freeman of the City of London, and made a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Farmers in 2019.

Peter was also a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Arbitrators, and one of the first lay members of the House of Commons Standards Committee (2012-2017).

More recently, Peter served as the independent Chairman of the Animal Welfare Committee for DEFRA and devolved administrations. He was an active County Councillor in Herefordshire since 2017 and gave his time as a trustee on four other charities, as well as the Addington Fund since 2011. For the last four years as Chairman, Peter has guided Addington, helping to strengthen and grow the charity, as well as the support network it offers, which included the recent development of Addington joining forces with fellow charity, Forage Aid.

The Addington Trustees and staff offer our sincerest condolences and warmest wishes to Peter's much-loved wife Gill, children Charlotte, Philippa and Henry, and grandchildren Harry, Lucy and Edward.

Peter's recent reflection, following last month's announcement of the merger, was very topical given the current changes we are all experiencing within agriculture, "We welcome the opportunity to collaborate, pool resources, combine networks and enhance our offering, which will in turn benefit those in need within our farming communities. With the increasing challenges that farmers and farm-workers



face, we are delighted that the Addington Fund will be able to offer a wider network of practical support." Commenting on this sad loss, Bill Young, CEO of Addington said, "Peter as Chairman was my "Rock". I bounced everything off him as he was the best soundboard anybody could have. Not only did he encourage me to grow the charity and increase public awareness, he also skilfully guided me with his wisdom, diplomacy and wealth of knowledge in all areas and quietly and effectively at times reined me in when it was necessary. As a chairman and a person, he was everything I could have asked for and we are going to miss him massively. He has left a huge hole to fill.

Preparing for the seasons ahead

We've had a wetter season than last year so there should be more forage available for the winter but please look at what you have in the way of forage and if you are going to have enough for the stock you have on the farm. If you don't think you are going to have enough to feed your animals, maybe think about moving on anything that isn't performing as well as it should.

We could have a late spring and late turn out and cattle prices have been good this year so why not take advantage of the price before having the stress of trying to find forage in the winter or in the spring?

Meet Ruthvoes ambitious new tenant

Meet our tenant, Louise Brill and read how our work/live rural housing enabled her to start up her own rural business



Louise Brill

Louise Brill, a current Addington Fund tenant living in an affordable home, contacted us when she had to leave her previous rented accommodation in Porth, Cornwall, where she was living with her 16 year old son. The self-employed single mum, running her own business 'Coastline Gardening Services', was faced with eviction when her landlord of 10 years decided to give notice on the property.

At the beginning of the 2019 school holidays, Louise only had 6 weeks to find a new and affordable home near to her son's school.

"I couldn't believe the situation I was in" Louise said. "I was a single mum being evicted from my home of 10 years with no back-up, barely any or little choice of anywhere else to live. It's so expensive to rent here down in Cornwall; I didn't know which way to turn".

"I was so worried as I quite literally had nowhere else to go. I don't have family close by and my son wouldn't have wanted to move schools. I was also self-employed so taking days off to try and find somewhere else to live, I was losing money day by day and the clock was ticking as we were becoming closer to being homeless. At this point, I'd really felt like I had hit rock bottom, until one day I came across a Ruthvoes property which was owned by a farming charity called the 'Addington Fund'."

She continued, "I didn't think a charity would look twice at me despite owning a rural business and working on farms doing landscaping, I simply didn't think I was good enough to deserve help from this kind of charity but after some encouragement from my friends, I plucked up the courage to get in touch".

"I spoke to a lady called Sue, who was so lovely. She made me believe that I was good enough to apply for this property so I went for it. Part of the application was to naturally give details about my business and what I would use the workshop for which came with the property. Now, I know this might sound silly to some but I'm a self-employed landscaper by day and a sea glass, trinket collector by night!" Louise smiles, "so I thought to myself 'I could use this workshop to create a jewellery shop!'."

"I've been collecting sea glass from Cornish beaches for years and with my job I always find odd bits of broken china and pottery that I know would look great wrapped and sculpted in to gorgeous metals to be worn as fine jewellery. This was my chance to really take the leap and start something new to support my current job, look after my son and maybe hopefully one day become a full time jewellery maker. I find it so relaxing to do, it's kind of my escape from the world, we all need that sometimes."

"The weeks went by with no progress of finding a new home and I had boxed up all of our belongings, the council had put us on the homeless list and I was warned I could be moved out of Cornwall in to a B&B, wherever would take us. I couldn't bear the thought of having to put my son through that but it was our reality.



We had no other choice. Then Addington Fund called me five days before our moving out date to tell us we'd been accepted as Ruthvoes' new tenants! We were over the moon and after looking around the property, we realised we'd been saved. It still makes me emotional remembering, it feels like yesterday. I just broke down in happy tears, I couldn't believe we had an affordable home to live in."

"We've been living at Ruthvoes for nearly four years now. We are very settled, happy and so grateful for Addington Fund's help. I think about it often, if it wasn't for them, where would I be right now? I'd hit an all-time low going through that experience, the worry of being homeless was awful. The Addington Fund couldn't have been more helpful and couldn't have come at a better time for me and my boy."

"I've worked a lot on the workshop." Louise says whilst showing Addington Fund staff around the shop. "When we came out of lockdown, I decided to do whatever I could to make the shop as attractive as possible. I've bought glass cabinets, a large carpet and filled the cabinets with fairy lights to improve the display of all the jewellery pieces I've made. It's a little piece of sparkling heaven that I have put my heart and soul in to, hoping I can make even more of a living from my this."

"I can't thank the Addington Fund enough for what they have done for me and my boy, I don't know if there is anything in the world that I can do which would say 'thank you' enough for their help. As a gesture, I have decided to make a set of jewellery and donate it to the Addington Fund Cornwall Farm Business Awards 2023, which are being held at the Eden Project on Thursday 28th September, as a gift from me to them. I hope it makes a fantastic amount of money for the farming charity and rural communities. It's the least I can do."

"I will be there at the awards too so if you see me there, please do come and say hello. I would love to meet everyone who supports the Addington Fund and in turn, supports myself and my son as well"

"I am so grateful to the Addington Fund for not just giving me and my son a home when we had nothing but for believing in me and the possibilities and potential for the business. In my heart, I'm always motivated to do my best wanting to make them proud."

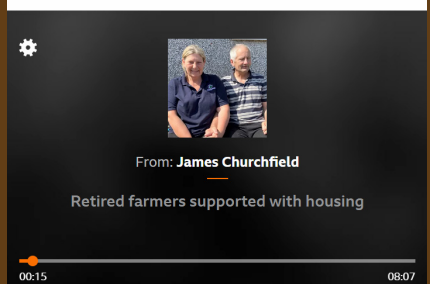
Due to James being unable to work because of his operation, Sarah had to work on other farms to pay farm workers to do the work she couldn't do on her own farm.

"We struggled on and on trying to carry on on our farm because we had nowhere else to go and paying the rent, paying the bills, it was exhausting" Sarah said. "James' health was poor, I was doing 70 - 80 hours a week on and off the farm and trying to look after James, it was horrific."

Sarah and James Hosking had a visit from Edward Richardson (Farm Cornwall) who pointed them in the right direction to ask for help. Sarah and James got in touch with us here at the Addington Fund and the rest is history.
